These improvements have occurred against a backdrop of budget cuts by the state and University, resulting in a 3.5 percent drop in our Greater Hartford Campus budget. Fortunately, the University continues to recognize and support our core work – our academic, research and community outreach programs. All of the funds for our high-tech classrooms and the Quantitative Center were provided by the Provost's Office. I will continue to speak up on behalf of you and our students, seeking support in every venue possible, and I continue to rely on you for input, suggestions and support in providing top-quality education for our students, who entrust their future in our care.

Together, we can make this another year of growth and discovery!

NO NUMBER SLUMP AT GHC

Your stocks may not be climbing but enrollment at our Greater Hartford Campus continues on its upward trend this semester, according to preliminary data from undergraduate Admissions Coordinator **Dennis Seymour**. "We have 415 new freshmen and approximately 54 new Transfer students for a total of 469 new degree-seeking students," he reports. Our total degree-seeking undergraduate students, including returning students, total 1324, a new record high for our Greater Hartford Campus. We are the largest of the regional campuses both in full-time and total number of students.

ADVISING AND EXPLORATION CENTER

The highly anticipated Advising and Exploration Center has been launched this semester to provide individualized academic advising for our students. Numerous studies have shown that a strong advising program is critical to student retention and to a student’s success in college. Our experienced staff aim to help students identify and assess their skills, values and interests; find their path through the educational process; take responsibility for their decisions and actions; and make smooth transitions to our campus, a major, study abroad, the Storrs campus, graduate school, career and beyond. As stated in the center’s mission: “The integration of the social, academic and career development of the student is the central focus and drive behind the center.”

We are fortunate to have **Katherine Ryan** time as Associate Directors for Advising Hartford Campus. Both Katie and Al bring their previous advisory positions at the as Co-Director of UConn's Academic College of Liberal Arts and Sciences issues for undergraduate CLAS students and acting as liaison for CLAS to the five regional campuses. She has extensive academic advising experience and business skills developed while managing the Northeast client base for Sightlines, LLC.

Al has been advising UConn students for the last eight years and has done everything from teach First Year Experience to Senior Year Experience and Career classes. He mentored academically at-risk students, instructing them in time management, study and organizational skills. As a Career Consultant in Storrs, Al has counseled undergraduate students and alumni in all steps of the career development process, from choosing a major to experiential learning. He has also developed Virtual Career Fairs and initiated other career programs. Al is an enthusiastic advocate of students working with Career Services from their freshman year onward.

Rounding out our Center for Student Development is **Jackie Marckett-Santiago**, our new Coordinator of Services for Students with Disabilities. Jackie served as Director of Counseling and Coordinator of Services for Persons with Disabilities at Mount Saint Mary College in Newburgh, New York, prior to joining our campus. As coordinator Jackie provided counseling, disability and outreach services to college students, advocated for students with special needs, provided information and training opportunities on disability related topics for the college community and supported faculty and staff with student concerns. Jackie will oversee disability services at the Greater Hartford campus and will assist students with accommodation needs and services, advocacy, academic skills and transition issues. She will be on our campus Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday, and will work Monday and Friday in the Center for Students with Disabilities in Storrs to meet the needs of regional campus students as they transition to the main campus.

NEW QUANTITATIVE “Q” CENTER OPENS

A new Quantitative Center for tutoring and learning quantitative subjects opened September 8th in Room 309, across from the Writing Center on the third floor of the Undergraduate Building. The Q Center provides tutoring in quantitative subjects such as mathematics, statistics, chemistry and biology. **Esteban Diaz, Ph.D.**, who joined our faculty this past year from the University of Iowa, where he won teaching awards, directs the center and teaches Calculus and Discrete Math on our campus. He is joined by professional and student peer tutors so that all student needs may be met. The center is open from Noon to 5 p.m., Monday through Thursday, and at other times by appointment.

SmartBoard - The Q Center is also equipped with state-of-the-art SmartBoard technology, which brings quantitative concepts alive through visual motion. Dr. Diaz will be offering workshops to teach faculty how to use the SmartBoard to enhance their teaching, or you can stop by for an

appointment or lesson on what the Q Center has to offer your students and you. Contact Dr. Diaz at esteban.diaz@uconn.edu.

THE WRITING CENTER

The Writing Center, located in room 303 of the Undergraduate Building, offers a relaxed environment where students receive help in writing in all disciplines at all stages in their academic careers. Students work with tutors in a collaborative, student-directed approach to learning. Our minimalist approach ensures students maintain control of their own work, thereby giving them the tools and confidence needed to become their own editors. The W Center is open Monday, Wednesday, and Thursday 10:00 AM - 4:00 PM, and Tuesday from 10:00 AM – 6:00 PM. Sign-up for appointments is available outside the W Center. If a student would like to set up a standing weekly appointment with a particular tutor, they can schedule a time through the administrative assistant. Our tutoring associates are available to workshop with classes, promote the center through classroom visits, and develop educational materials for use by faculty, tutors and students. TECHNOLOGY ADDED TO CLASSROOMS

Over the summer more technology came to the Greater Hartford Campus in the form of Tech-Ready Classrooms. The Institute for Teaching & Learning installed technological teaching equipment in four Undergraduate Building classrooms (209, 212, 216, 312) and in one Information Technology Building computer classroom (113). Each of these rooms now comes equipped with a desktop computer, LCD projector, screen, control panel and sound system. The computer comes with a variety of standard programs and connects to the UConn website and Internet. The computers can also be used to play CDs, DVDs and to access information off of USB drives. Soon to be added to these classrooms are teaching stations with DVD/VHS players and document cameras able to project printed materials, overheads and slides. Devices such as video cameras, iPods and MP3 players can also be patched into the system for class viewing or listening.



These five new installations bring to 17 the number of high-tech classrooms available across the Greater Hartford Campus. A complete list of technology classrooms and equipment operating instructions will soon be available on the campus IT website. VISTA INSTALLATION

The Information Technology Center reports that Microsoft's Vista operating system will now come installed on all new PCs purchased by the University. Along with Vista comes Microsoft Office 2007. At this point the systems in Tech Building computer lab 112 all have Vista while the remaining computer labs continue to use Microsoft XP and Office 2003. Information Technology has also updated several department office computers with Vista during the past few months.

LEARNING COMMONS COMMITTEE

For over a year the Learning Commons Committee has examined the options for establishing a Learning Commons on the Greater Hartford Campus. The term Learning Commons refers to a large, centralized area or space deliberately designed to foster collaborative and interactive learning outside the classroom. Undergraduate students are increasingly encouraged to work collaboratively to enhance their learning, and the goal of the Learning Commons is to encourage and support that effort.

Learning Commons' services currently available on this campus are the Quantitative or Q Center, the Writing or W Center, Student Advising, Counseling and Disability Services, all of which are housed in the Undergraduate Building. The Greater Hartford Campus also provides Information Technology and the Harleigh B. Trecker Library, each in its own building. While these services are not configured in close proximity to each other, as is typical in a Learning Commons, they function successfully on this campus.

Could all these services be centralized in one place? Yes, but it could not be done easily or cost effectively. The obvious "hub" of the Greater Hartford Campus undergraduate student body is the Undergraduate Building. Unfortunately, there is not enough space there to host a consolidated Learning Commons. While it would be advantageous to have all of the services at the same location, it is not possible within our current facilities.

Based on the consensus of the Learning Commons Committee, it was recommended that the appropriate approach on the Greater Hartford Campus would be to utilize and enhance what is already working. Within these parameters the committee recommended:

- Development of a Virtual Learning Commons that exists on the campus website, easily accessible from the student page and home page. Our Virtual Learning Commons webpage will be a portal to each of the services our students rely on and will be accessible from any location on the campus or any office campus location via the Internet.
- A full-time Writing Center Coordinator – Usage numbers over the last year justify a full-time position for the W Center.
- A Director of Tutoring and Counseling Services to:
 - establish communication with all academic programs
 - encourage the mutual exchange of ideas, consultation, and referral of students
 - know and be aware of academic and other institutional policies and procedures
 - serve as liaison between Student Services and Academic Services programs and between individual students and those programs
 - encourage academic programs and other student service areas to work together, sharing their knowledge and abilities when working with students
 - Convert the current reference area of Trecker Library into a comfortable and attractive learning space for group project work
 - Install two group computer work stations with comfortable seating in the library.

FITNESS CENTER IN TOP SHAPE

Recognizing the impact physical health has on mental well being, funds were allocated from the Director's Office to update our Greater Hartford Campus Fitness Center. Pack in a Power Lunch with a colleague or student. Join IT staff member **Joel Norris**, who lost over 100 pounds over two years through daily visits to the Fitness Center during his lunch break. Check out our new:

- Treadmill for those aspiring to run the upcoming Hartford Marathon or to squeeze in a daily walk on rainy days
- Elliptical machine, which mimics the upper and lower body exercise of cross-country skiing, providing an excellent aerobic workout without the pounding of the joints incurred by running
- Adjustable weight-lifting press bench.



A completely-outfitted weight room is housed across the hall from the aerobic conditioning equipment, which includes a rowing machine and stationary bicycle. Working with weights is critical to maintaining healthy bone density, especially for our female students, staff and faculty.

Free instruction -- UConn graduate kinesiology students staff our facilities and offer free instructions for those who have never lifted weights or set foot on a treadmill or elliptical machine.



We are fortunate to have Storrs Graduate Student **Ndidi Okobi** back this year. Ndidi (“Didi”) worked here last year, as well as this past summer, and was very instrumental as a consultant in the selection of the three new pieces of equipment.

We are fortunate and delighted to have these graduate students at our Fitness Center. Their efforts are supplemented by undergraduate students **Wayne Newman, Will Gomez** and **Andres Calixto**, who provide coverage and assistance in the afternoons and on Friday, 9 AM-2 PM. Our budget does not permit evening or Saturday/weekend hours, so please plan your visits around this schedule.

Please be advised that Monday through Thursday the graduate students teach a 1-credit Health Fitness course. During class times, 9:30–10:45 AM, the Fitness Center is restricted to class members. A 1-credit EKIN Yoga course is also offered on Saturdays in the Gampel Student Center.
